

What is a CEDS? Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy

A document that identifies ways to

support businesses

create more jobs

improve quality of life and

increase resilience to changes and threats

How do we build a strong regional economy?

Increase money coming into the region, with a focus on producing something other places need/want

(locally made/valueadded products)

Keep dollars in the region; promote local businesses and services

(stores, restaurants, mechanics, construction, etc.)

Reduce money leaving the region

(shopping outside region, transportation costs, shipping, etc.)

Five-Year Update

CEDS must go through a robust update every five years, with shorter updates annually.

The five-year update was last completed in 2018.



- This current process is a 5-Year Update 2024 2029 CEDS.
- Process and actions are shared by communities, partners in the region.

State of Alaska Funds Kuskokwim Area Winter Ice Road
Ice roads are unique transportation links moving goods & services in rural Alaska.

 A regionwide winter trails plan from Platinum to Nunam Iqua was kicked off in 2022 (estimated 5-years to complete). Includes acquiring easements/right of way and installing tripod stations.

- According to High
 Country News articles,
 markers have doubled in
 price from \$16 two years
 ago to \$32 in 2023.
- In recent years, the state contributed 4,000 uniform trail markers.

- In July 2021 Calista Corporation received \$721,000 from BIA's Energy and Mineral Development Program toward the development of the Pilcher Quarry project.
- As of fall 2023, the Pilcher
 Mountain quarry was supplying material to St. Mary's, Russian
 Mission, and Marshall.

The Emmonak port project includes a dock to receive ocean and river barges and a ramp that will be available to the 24/7 as a boat launch. The project will be completed in 2023.

Update


- Pandemic made it clear this is a need, especially important when no beds in the hospital are available.
- As of March 2022, project was still just conceptual, mostly with Bethel Search and Rescue.
- Alaska National Guard continues resource deployment to Bethel as necessary.
- Alaska DOT&PF planning to host a SAR training for Bethel SAR end of February 2023.

What We Have Learned So Far

Challenges

- Climate change is affecting reliability and safety of transportation routes and impacting infrastructure.
- High cost of fuel affects subsistence activities and travel.
- High cost of fuel results in higher travel and freight costs.
- Cost of maintaining ice road has increased with cost of fuel and materials.

* = emerging as theme in Community Assessment Tool



Opportunities

- Increasing recognition of ice road as a critical regional transportation route.
- Improved connectivity in the region can make rural travel safer.
- Disaster declaration funding bringing opportunities for improvement.
- Regional representation on the U.S. DOT Advisory Committee on Transportation Equity.

Funding – Some Examples

State:

 Alaska Department of Transportation & Public Facilities. Example: Winter Trails funding. Tribes can apply for up to \$50,000 for trail marking. Can be used to pay searcher, workers, or purchase supplies.


