







- Three Yup'ik UAF ANSEP students were featured as keynote speakers for the October 2021 YK CEDS Work Session, providing a leading example of an all-Yup'ik waterfowl research crew.

- Calista awarded 362 CECI natural resource scholarships over the last five years.

- TKC is building subsistence advocacy into their internship program.
- Four of the current
 Tamamta cohort members
 have ties to the Y-K.

What We Have Learned So Far

Challenges

- Lack of regional and community-level data collected and/or available.
- High grocery costs are negatively impacting communities.
- Low salmon numbers in both the Kuskokwim and Yukon Rivers and resulting fishery closures and increased regulations.²
- Lack of capacity for outreach on supportive services and programs like Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, Women, Infants and Children, etc.³
- Food insecurity is high in the region.⁴
 - Kusilvak Census Area has the second highest rate of food insecurity in the nation in 2021 at 25.9%.
 - Bethel Census area has above average rates at 20.5% which is nearly double the national food insecurity rate (10.4%).

Opportunities

- Work of the Kuskokwim and Yukon Inter-Tribal Fish Commissions.
- Co-Stewardship and Co-Management discussions and agreements toward local/Tribal management of subsistence and other resources.
- Formalize data collection (some agencies are already working toward this!).
- Collaboration for joint outreach efforts on programs like SNAP and WIC.
- Alaska-wide food security efforts are in the works:
 - House Bill 298 (Food Strategy Task Force): Report development.
 - Alaska Food Policy Council: Food Systems Action Plan.
 - Alaska Salmon Research Task Force: They have a YK work group!

Food Security Data Indicators

- Natural resource stewardship jobs (created or maintained)
 - Bureau of Economic Analysis: Employment in forestry, fishing, and farming
- Number of businesses providing farm-to-table or seafoodto-table products.
- Increase in the number of value-added production and distribution jobs in the agriculture and fishing industries.
- Increase in the number of schools in the region serving locally-harvested products.
- Others?

Potential Strategies/Topics:

- Expand local employment, youth involvement, and mentorship in natural resource research, management, and subsistence decision-making at all levels.
- Ensure communities have sufficient emergency food supplies to feed the community in the event of a disaster.
- Identify ways to grow and produce more food locally.
- Identify ways to mitigate climate impacts on subsistence resources (e.g., low berry harvests, toxicity in fish, etc.).
- Increase the use of SNAP, WIC, and other benefits across the region.
