Overview of Tool Purpose and Timeline

- Purpose: Understand YK community priorities. The results will referenced alongside other YK Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) feedback, including results from the YK CEDS Work Session focus area breakouts (available here).
- How Responses will be Used: The responses are used to update the YK CEDS and consistently identify needs so the Association of Village Council Presidents (AVCP) and partners can assist with advocacy and programming.
- **Content**: The survey asks communities about their priorities and barriers in eight key focus areas and an additional "other" category for all topics not addressed.
- **Timeline**: The survey was open from October 2023 February 2024. AVCP hopes to conduct the assessment annually.


Tool Methodology

- I. Response Options: Communities could submit responses via mail, fax, over the phone, electronically through SurveyMonkey, PDF fillable form, or by email.
- 2. **Promotion**: AVCP promoted the Tool through direct mail to each community's Tribal Administrator (TA), email, calls, partner outreach, and through YK CEDS working groups and February Work Session.
- 3. Process: Most TAs completed the tool based on their experience with leadership and through community input gathered at community meetings. Another common way TAs filled out the tool was through referencing current and past plans.
- 4. Incentives: AVCP offered communities the opportunity to win \$1,000, \$500, or \$250 from a pool of the communities who responded to the Community Assessment Tool.

Tool Limitations

- Representation: Only one-third of YK communities responded to the tool (17 out of 51). Therefore, results are not representative of the entire region.
 - The responses were completed by Tribal Administrators and may not represent the viewpoints of all residents in each community.
 - While respondents were asked to share their top priority in each category, some opted to include more than one.
- Potential Bias: The tool provided examples of potential topics within each focus area (see copy of slides at end of this results summary). This may have prompted some respondents to use/reference examples instead of craft a unique/relevant response, potentially biasing results.

Community Response (blue = responded)




Guide to Reviewing Assessment Tool Results


"We have been waiting for several years for the extension of water and sewer services to a part of the village that has our local clinic, Headstart building, and now six new homes are without water and sewer services."





"Public safety is number I priority. Turn over rates are very high and the training is limited for our TPO's."

"Purchase emergency medical equipment (i.e. CPR stuff, first aid kit, etc.) for the community building. Provide CPR/First aid training for Council, staff & tribal members."


"Students need to engage in more cultural activities, i.e. hunting, camping, and gathering. Need to identify traditional medicine and types of food to gather."

Conversation: Sit down with community leaders, such as the Tribal Council President and/or City Manager, to talk through the topics and fill it out together.
